SCHOLARSHIP & BURSARY DESCRIPTIONS:

SECONDARY:

Audre Lorde LGBTQ2S+ Scholarship

Audre Geraldine Lorde was a black writer, feminist, womanist, lesbian, and civil rights activist, who dedicated both her life and her creative talent to confronting and addressing the injustices of racism, sexism, and homophobia. (Died 17 November 1992)

This scholarship is given to an individual under the age of 29 who is pursuing post-secondary education, has made significant contributions to the community, and who identifies as LGBTQ2S+. HBHC recognizes and respects the fact that identifying as a member of the LGBTQ2S+ community is a personal decision. HBHC honours one's decision to identify openly or to decide not to do so at all. If the applicant wishes to keep their application and awarded scholarship (if applicable) private, this must be communicated by email to jchaselection@hbhc.ca. The applicant may also opt out of accepting the scholarship at the event and also has the option of appointing someone to accept on their behalf, with appropriate consent. The External Selections Committee will take appropriate measures to safeguard the privacy of the applicant. Additionally, the Committee will only communicate with the applicant by way of their preferred email address.

Dampney Scholarship for Civic Leadership

Kojo Dampney is an avid civic leader who has worked tirelessly to make Hamilton a better city for all residents. From 2018 to 2023, Kojo was the Executive Director of the Hamilton Centre for Civic Inclusion (HCCI). During his time as the Executive Director, he was instrumental in supporting Black youth through the Black Youth Mentorship Program in partnership with the Hamilton Wentworth District School board. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Kojo worked with community organizations, community health experts, residents, and academics to raise the issues of health equity, vaccine confidence and the importance of Public Health. Kojo is also an established musician who has contributed to the Hamilton music scene by running festivals where emerging Black Indigenous People of Color artists could share their talents with an audience. Kojo advocated successfully to have musicians paid fairly when they performed at any city event.

This scholarship is given to a secondary student who has demonstrated community leadership and civic engagement in their school, workplace, neighbourhood, or community. The individual must work collaboratively to bring about transformational change.

Dr. Ethilda "Tilly" Johnson "Business/Entrepreneurship" Bursary

Jamaican born, Dr. Ethilda "Tilly" Johnson was the first Black vendor at Hamilton's Farmers Market and successfully operated her business for four decades. In 2002, Johnson was awarded an honorary doctorate from McMaster University and, in 2006, she was inducted into the Hamilton Gallery of Distinction for her role as a community leader and successful

entrepreneur. In 2014, Illuminence Magazine awarded Dr. Johnson with the “Legacy of Merit Award” in recognition of her legacy and invaluable contributions to youth and community development. (Tilly died August 19, 2016, ON)

This bursary is awarded to an individual who is pursuing studies in business and/or whose goal is to be an entrepreneur.

Good Shepherd Health and Social Services Scholarship

Good Shepherd has been a compassionate presence in the Hamilton community for the past 60 years. Its work is based on a fundamental belief in providing hope and restoring dignity to the city’s most vulnerable citizens through programs that seek to tear down barriers and establish a path to a stable and healthy life.

This scholarship is granted to an individual whose school and community contributions best exemplify the values of compassion, hope and dignity and who has shown an interest in pursuing a career in health or social services.

Hamilton Steelworkers Area Council "Community Matters" Scholarship

The Hamilton Steelworkers Area Council has taken on the mantra “**Community Matters**”, a principle which drives its work in the community in organizing barbecues, working with community hubs and several charities, serving the homeless and those in need, hosting The International Day For The Elimination of Racial Discrimination, among other volunteer-driven activities. Immigrants Matter Bursary

The Immigrants Matter bursary honours the important contributions that immigrants make to the Hamilton community while acknowledging the unique challenges they may face during the settlement process.

This bursary is given to an individual who is an immigrant to the City of Hamilton. Preference is given to an individual who demonstrates financial need and has overcome difficulty in settling within the community.

Lincoln Alexander “Breaking down Barriers” Scholarship

Lincoln MacCauley Alexander, CC, QC, OOnt, lawyer, parliamentarian, public servant, chancellor and Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. Alexander was the first Black Canadian Member of Parliament, Cabinet Minister and Lieutenant-Governor (Ontario). There are schools and a parkway named in his honour. (*Died 19 October 2012 in Hamilton, ON*).

This scholarship is awarded to an individual who has demonstrated leadership on issues related to breaking down systemic barriers.

Raymond G. Lewis “Sports Leadership” Scholarship

Raymond Gray Lewis was a Canadian track and field athlete, and the first Canadian-born Black Olympic medalist. Lewis was nicknamed *Rapid Ray* for his speed on the track. He excelled in 100, 200, 400 and 800 metre distances in high school and captured 17 national high school championships (including a record four in one day) while a student at Hamilton's Central Collegiate. *(Died 15 November 2003, Hamilton, ON)*

This scholarship is given to an individual who has accomplished significant achievements in sports leadership.

Reverend George Horton Scholarship

Reverend George Horton was born in Guyana. Horton lived an adventurous life that included serving as a police officer in Guyana, earning a master's degree at New York University and becoming Hamilton's first Black Police Chaplain. As a pastor, Horton served at many Hamilton churches, including Stewart Memorial. *(Died 26 February 2017, Hamilton, ON)*

This scholarship is given to an individual who has shown interest in the area of Law or Religious/Cultural Studies.

The STEM scholarship seeks to encourage Black youth with a curiosity and interest in STEM to explore the possibilities and find a place for themselves in STEM-related fields.

Dejehan (Luckystickz) Hamilton is a singer-songwriter, recording artist and one of the leading steelpan/percussionists in Canada who has worked with such legends as Harry Belafonte, Brian McKnight and Chili (of TLC) and others. He has developed into an international award-winning and dynamic motivational speaker focused on youth/youth influencers and also works directly with youth locally by connecting them with resources that support their overall health and well-being. As the Founder and Executive Director of the Tune In Foundation, an organization focused on youth empowerment through music education across the globe, Dejehan has worked to positively impact those who are marginalized through targeted programming, one of which is participation in the annual Musica Palooza Camps throughout Ontario.

Evelyn Myrie “Political Action” Bursary

Evelyn Myrie is one of the co-founders of the Reverend John C Holland Awards. She has held leadership positions in government, business and the non-profit sectors, with a strong focus on helping organizations translate their mission into action. She has been an independent businesswoman, served as program director at Status of Women Canada, and was the executive director of the Hamilton Centre for Civic Inclusion. She was also a founding director of Peel Newcomer Strategy Group. Evelyn Myrie has been an active political figure in the community.

This bursary is given to the individual who has shown outstanding leadership in political action within the community.

Marlene Thomas “Community Advocacy” Bursary

Inspired by the co-founder of the Reverend John C Holland Awards, Marlene Thomas, this bursary encourages youth and young adults to take action in their communities and choose an educational pathway that further supports their work. Marlene Thomas led the Hamilton Cultural and Ethnic Mosaic Association, Equality For All organization, and served as the co-chairperson with Mayor Robert Morrow for the Hamilton Mayor’s Committee against Racism and Discrimination. Ms. Thomas currently serves as Chair Emerita of Hamilton Black History Council in recognition of her steadfast leadership during her tenure as chair.

Nelson Mandela “Social Justice” Scholarship

Nelson Mandela was a South African anti-apartheid revolutionary, politician, lawyer and philanthropist, who served as President of South Africa from 1994 to 1999. After decades of false imprisonment, he became the country's first black head of state and President of the African National Congress. Mandela is widely regarded as an icon of democracy and social justice. He received more than 250 honours, including the Nobel Peace Prize. *(Died 5 December 2013, Johannesburg, South Africa)*

This scholarship is given to an individual who has demonstrated leadership on issues related to social justice.

To apply for the 2025 Reverend John C. Holland Awards, all applicants must attest that they meet ALL of the following eligibility criteria at the time of submission:

- ☐ I self-identify as a person of African or Caribbean descent.
- ☐ My principal address is within the City of Hamilton.
- ☐ I am between the ages of 16 and 24 years of age (unless specified otherwise in the award description)
- ☐ I am a Canadian Citizen, Permanent Resident or Convention Refugee.
- ☐ I am a Grade 12 or post-secondary student and will be attending or returning to a post-secondary, trade or technical institution in the 2025/2026 academic year. (Applicants returning to secondary school or deferring their enrolment are not eligible)
- ☐ I understand that if selected as a winner, I must provide proof of my enrollment in a post-secondary, trade or technical institution for the 2025/2026 academic year in order to receive my award funds.
